Looking to the Future

On my future with KVUUC:

During the past several months Frances and I have been in a process of discernment regarding my, and our, future with KVUUC. I have consulted with several ministerial mentors on the issue as well as members of our Council on Ministry (Debbie, Bruce and Becca), various members of the congregation, and, of course, my own heart. I have concluded that if the Board and congregation see fit to offer me an extension of my contract past next August, I would be pleased and honored to serve another year. I was gratified by the attendance and feedback I heard from the congregation's conversation on ministry in April led by Tandi Rogers from the UUA, and by the willingness of generous persons to step up and assume critical tasks in our congregational life. I am excited by the prospect of collaborative leadership with Co-Presidents Kristen and Debbie, at the possibility of leading the congregation in a visioning process I call "Dreamcasting", of participating in our all-congregational retreat at the "Lazy F" next Fall, of working further with dear friends on the Kittitas Valley Interfaith Alliance (4 services already planned), of working with our incomparable duo Jan and Maggie in building our music and RE programs, of possibly continuing on with the "Build Your Own Theology" group. As for the services I lead I am excited by plans made in consultation with the Worship Council to explore core UU themes such as each of our seven Principles, our particular conception of spirituality, our proud history, and the evolution of our concept of divinity.

I should also be clear that if it occurs next year would be my last. I will be approaching 74 and sense that it is time for retirement (I prefer the Spanish: "jubilacion"). I would hope to be of help in using the year to prepare for the direction the congregation wishes to go next.

News from the UUA:

As some of you may have already read our denomination has been visited by pain and controversy. Earlier in April, The Reverend Peter Morales resigned as President of the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA) as did two other senior officials. You can read more about it at www.uuworld.org (also p. 5).

The controversy leading to the resignations had to do with criticism over the hiring of a white, male minister to be Southern Regional Lead of the UUA instead of a woman of color that had applied. Those who spoke out in opposition used direct and harsh language alleging that, under Morales' leadership, the UUA has continued to be a "white supremacist" organization. Morales' initial response was also heated, stating: "What bothers me is the characterization of the UUA as a 'white supremacist' organization. [cont.]

If you call us that, what do you call the Aryan Nation?" On resigning he admitted that his words had made the matter worse rather than better.

I am saddened by the fact that oppression of minorities has been with us for far too long. I am also saddened by the obvious pain visited colleagues and friends involved in this particular incident and their families. An oft-repeated adage is our Unitarian Universalist values call us to seek to build a better world. In our efforts to do so, we sometimes stumble and trip over each other. When we do, we seek, to the best of our ability, to forgive ourselves, and each other, and begin again in love.

Three co-presidents to lead until GA 2017

In a special meeting Monday night, April 10, the Unitarian Universalist Association Board of Trustees appointed three people to serve as interim co-presidents of the UUA until a president is elected June 24 by the General Assembly.

UUA President Peter Morales resigned on April 1, three months before the end of his tenure, in the face of a controversy over UUA hiring practices, which critics say systematically favor white UU ministers. The Rev. Harlan Limpert, chief operating officer, and the Rev. Scott Tayler, director of Congregational Life, announced they would also step down. (See our updated guide to this evolving story.)

In an announcement released at 11 p.m. Monday, the board said it had appointed the Rev. Sofía Betancourt, the Rev. William G. Sinkford, and Leon Spencer to serve as co-presidents. The board made its decision in a closed meeting, or executive session, before releasing the letter.

"In making this appointment the Board intends to recognize the significant opportunity before us, to recognize the time constraints involved, and to model a profoundly collaborative approach to shared leadership," the board said, in a letter published on the UUA website and on the board's Facebook page. It noted that at its special meeting the previous Thursday, April 6, the board unanimously approved a UUA Presidential Transition Plan to "frame the brief tenure of the transition team and help to shape Unitarian Universalism into the future."

Betancourt, who is assistant professor of theology and ethics at Starr King School for the Ministry in Berkeley, California, will serve as interim co-president for the Commission for Institutional Change. "Her work as a religious educator, parish minister, and seminary professor provide well-honed leadership qualities [that] will surely enrich the team," the board said.

Sinkford, who is senior minister of First Unitarian Church of Portland, Oregon, and who served as UUA president from 2001 to 2009, will serve as interim co-president "for the roles of president as outlined in the UUA bylaws."

Spencer is professor emeritus in Leadership, Technology, and Human Development at Georgia Southern University*. He will serve as interim co-president for Constituent Outreach, according to the board. "He is a person of broad experience and the 2007 recipient of the UUA's annual Distinguished Service Award who has been a longtime leader in our journey toward becoming an antiracist and multicultural faith," the board announced. Spencer formerly served on the UUA Board of Trustees, chaired the Nominating Committee, and held many district leadership roles, the board said.

Bee Garden Buzz

Lupine

Lupines are great for adding architectural interest to the landscape with their upright spires of flowers. Some are small, some are tall, but all are showy. They come in a wide range of colors, too -- from shades of blue and purple to pink, red, orange, yellow, and white -- so you're sure to find the perfect one for your yard.



Growing Conditions

Easy to grow, lupine thrives in cool, moist locations. It prefers full sun to light shade and average soils, but will tolerate sandy, dry soil. Plants develop long taproots, so loosen the soil to a depth of 12-20 inches using a rototiller or garden fork. They will not grow in clay.



Thoughts from Around the Country

CROSSING THRESHOLDS

"We knew the world would not be the same. A few people laughed, a few people cried, most people were silent. I remembered the line from the Hindu scripture, the Bhagavad-Gita; Vishnu is trying to persuade the Prince that he should do his duty and, to impress him, takes on his multi-armed form and says, 'Now I am become Death, the destroyer of worlds.' I suppose we all thought that, one way or another."

—Robert Oppenheimer

At times in my life, I've had to step back to fully take in the puzzling enormity of some action or decision I've taken. In those moments I've instinctively reached out for some kind of comfort in the form of a self-embrace, hugging myself with my arms crisscrossing my belly, reaching around my back, as I wondered "What have I done?" These moments were sometimes good and other times bad, but usually the implications were somewhat ambiguous.

Scientist Robert Oppenheimer ushered humanity into the nuclear age by unleashing the power of the atom in the 1940s. Oppenheimer realized that life as anyone had experienced it before was forever changed. His generation slipped into an uncharted landscape with an array of terrifying and beneficial possibilities in it. Oppenheimer couched this realization in religious language of scripture, quoting lines from the Bhagavad Gita: "I have become death, destroyer of worlds." One world order was dying while another world order was being born — and Oppenheimer was left wondering, What have I done?

When I was ordained to the Unitarian Universalist ministry two years ago I had a similar realization: I had crossed a threshold and entered an entirely new world as a religious leader. The ceremony, participants, speeches, and even the cake communicated to me on a visceral level that life as I knew it would never be the same. In that moment I resisted the urge to hug myself, not wanting to be a spectacle at the spectacle of an ordination. But that moment is seared into my memory as a huge, joyous threshold event.

Whatever your threshold event is, whether it's developing a curative vaccine, entering into marriage, starting a new job, moving into a new home, becoming a parent, or becoming a UU minister, I hope you allow yourself the grace of a self-hug as well as the hugs of loved ones. May you be open to the grace that seeks to embrace us all on our journeys.


Prayer:
